Led by Young People

In this Scottish Year of Young People the service conducted by Bridges on 16 September was significant. Our young people, members of the group which meets every Sunday during the morning service, led the whole worship time that day and, in it, addressed the vital contemporary issue of mental health.

Making creative use of video clips, stories and bricks of challenges which could, with help, become a path to walk on, our young people told us that it was "OK to be not OK" and led us in all-age worship, prayer and reflection on a significant issue which affects people in all generations. They were well supported by Shona Cook, who has, in leading Bridges over the past months, worked to enable the issues and contributions to come very much from our young people.

It was encouraging to see so many young people with us in worship: that does the hearts of our more mature members good. It was deeply impressive to hear the quality of the contribution of all our young people. They are not merely the hope for the church of the future but are very much an integral part of today's church.

The purpose of the "Year" is to give young people a platform, a stronger voice on issues which affect their lives. Our service suggests that it may be more than that.

All of us may have been helped to see that Christian service doesn't really have a minimum age. It's entirely possible for teenagers and young adults, with only a little guidance, to lead the whole church community in high quality worship, enabling us to think, allowing us to hear of God's care for all, and prompting us to make responses both in devotion and a determination to think and act differently.

One weakness of a "Year" of anything is that, when the time is over, the issue can be forgotten. That needn't be the case, particularly if we see the significant contribution of our young people not as a single event but, rather, the start of more regular involvement.

Who knows where, in God's providing, we may be led by all people – those who are older and also the young.

Apology to Orchardhill

Orchardhill's Local Church Review report was tabled at the Glasgow Presbytery meeting at Springburn Church on Tuesday 11 September. Reference was made in it to how we 'endured a period of difficulty and uncertainty' during more than two years of vacancy. That prompted an unexpected, though extremely welcome apology to Orchardhill from the floor of the meeting.

The apology came from Robert Hynd, Representative Elder at Broomhill Hyndland Church, who had led the currently proposed reform of the Church of Scotland's Discipline Act. In that latter role he visited a group of us to ascertain what problems Orchardhill had encountered and how we were affected by then current Act.

In addressing Presbytery he drew attention to the first sentence of the LCR visiting team's recommendations and advice in the report: '*The team were impressed by the resilience of the congregation in overcoming recent difficulties and the positive way in which they have responded resulting in a committed close knit fellowship.*'

Robert continued in addressing Presbytery: "The folk at Giffnock Orchardhill have been through all kinds of hell, which lasted far too long and which, happily, they are now on the other side of. I know just a little of the pain and the great personal cost to the officebearers and others of their experience of our Church's disciplinary processes, having spent time with them, as part of the work which I recently led on the General Assembly's Legal Questions Committee on the reform of the Church's disciplinary procedures. If this Presbytery and others approve the Overture coming our way soon, I hope that Overture will be enacted at next year's General Assembly.

"The cost in time, anger, sheer frustration and not a few bitter tears, for all at Giffnock Orchardhill, was an enormous price for any congregation to pay for something which was not their fault. Although it is far too late, on behalf of the whole Church, I would apologise for all that hurt, commend their collective faith in a Lord who has taken them from the darkness into the light, and rejoice with them in this wonderful report and wish Grant Barclay and Bill McMurtrie and all the good folk at Giffnock Orchardhill, God's richest blessings for their 'committed close knit fellowship' in the years to come.

My words of thanks to Robert (both during the meeting and again later privately) could not fully convey my sincere gratitude to him, not only for his address to Presbytery but also for when he took time to visit a group of us in Orchardhill to find out how much the then current Act had impacted against our congregation.

Women's Ordination

"The Church's Trouble with Women - from disinheritance to God's promised community?" is the title of the Thinking Allowed lecture in Orchardhill on Thursday 25 October. The speaker is Dr Lesley Orr, historian, theologian and activist for gender justice.

2018 is the 50th anniversary of women's ordination in the Church of Scotland and also the 100th anniversary of partial female enfranchisement. The talk will focus on Scotland, in particularly the Presbyterian tradition in the last 150 years.

Lesley is engaged in initiatives for active citizenship in Scotland and recently coordinated the commemorations for the 50th anniversary of women's ordination in the Church of Scotland. She also a member of the Iona Community and is on the gender justice policy task group of the World Communion of Reformed Churches.

Orchardhill's Local Church Review

The Local Church Review of Giffnock Orchardhill was received and accepted at Glasgow Presbytery's September meeting.

The review, which is referred also on page 3 of this publication, opened with the following **Brief Overview** from the visiting team:

"The congregation is currently at an exciting stage in its development. Between 2013 and 2016 they endured a period difficulty and uncertainty prior to the appointment of Rev Dr Grant Barclay as their minister. This experience has resulted in members becoming more committed and resourceful and also produced a deepening of fellowship. Despite their difficulties the congregational numbers and giving have remained stable. Most of the members reside within the parish and represent a breadth of theological views.

"They seek to welcome all people in the parish to experience Christian fellowship at Orchardhill.

"For some time there has been awareness within the congregation of the need for a specific vision for future growth and development. A conference in 2010 suggested developing six pillars of Mission, Discipleship, Worship, Ministry, Youth and Fellowship. While some aims had been achieved, it was recognised that a review was required, and a further conference in September 2017 resulted in the formation of six vision groups as detailed in the Action Plan. Teams have been appointed to identify new initiatives, make them progress and report back to the congregation regularly at morning services with the aim of informing and involving the whole congregation."

The review ended with the following **Recommendations and Advice**: "The team were impressed by the resilience of the congregation in overcoming recent difficulties and the positive way in which they have responded resulting in a committed close knit fellowship. Under the enthusiastic leadership of Grant Barclay they have developed an ambitious action plan to advance Christ's kingdom through spiritual growth, outreach and pastoral care. For this to be successful all the congregation will have to commit to the vision and we hope that this will result in a continuing vibrant congregation.

"We would suggest that a priority to engage with younger people and families would be important to grow the church of the future."
