<u>Quiet Time – Wednesday 3rd August 2022</u>

Good evening, and a warm welcome to our evening time of reflection which is coming to you from Orchardhill Parish Church in Giffnock. Whether you're near or far, a regular or first-time attender we are joined together not only by technology but by the Spirit of the Risen Lord!

Few people beside Jesus himself, have had such an impact on the church or the Christian faith as the Apostle Paul. It is to his vision, energy, and enthusiasm that we owe the transformation of Christianity from a branch of Judaism to a worldwide faith which still today continues to grow. Yet few people could have seemed more unlikely candidates for such a job, given Paul's hatred for anything to do with Jesus, unparalleled in his time. Admittedly he had many ideally suited gifts which God was able to make use of, but there were equally as many characteristics totally unsuited to the demands of his calling, not least his poor health, his unimposing presence and his so called "thorn in the flesh" whatever that might have been. Yet not only was he used uniquely by God, in those early days; he continues to speak equally powerfully today, his letters together making up a substantial portion of the New Testament. Today, then, we stop to consider both the man himself and the message he preached. What can we learn from the way Jesus changed Paul's life? What lessons can we draw from his experiences? And what does he have to say concerning our own faith and discipleship? If we are willing to explore such questions, we will find the voice of Paul speaking to us here and now and, through that, the voice of God Himself.

Let us pray together:

Sovereign God, we thank you for the way you have spoken across the centuries, the way you have repeatedly changed people and transformed situations in a manner which, to human eyes, looked impossible.

Inspire us this evening as we reflect upon one such example of your renewing power and help us through that to understand more clearly everything you are able to do in our own lives and the world today.

Let's hear now the reading from Galatians 1: 13-24.

For you have heard of my previous way of life in Judaism, how intensely I persecuted the church of God and tried to destroy it. ¹⁴ I was advancing in Judaism beyond many of my own age among my people and was extremely zealous for the traditions of my fathers. ¹⁵ But when God, who set me apart from my mother's womb and called me by his grace, was pleased ¹⁶ to reveal his Son in me so that I might preach him among the Gentiles, my immediate response was not to consult any human being. ¹⁷ I did not go up to Jerusalem to see those who were apostles before I was, but I went into Arabia. Later I returned to Damascus.

¹⁸ Then after three years, I went up to Jerusalem to get acquainted with Cephas^[b] and stayed with him fifteen days. ¹⁹ I saw none of the other apostles—only James, the Lord's brother. ²⁰ I assure you before God that what I am writing you is no lie.

²¹ Then I went to Syria and Cilicia. ²² I was personally unknown to the churches of Judea that are in Christ. ²³ They only heard the report: "The man who formerly persecuted us is now preaching the faith he once tried to destroy." ²⁴ And they praised God because of me.

A Reflection by Paul:

It looked impossible at the beginning, utterly beyond me.

And I don't mind confessing there were many times when I felt like giving up, throwing in the towel and cutting my losses.

Surprised?

You shouldn't be.

After all, just look at what I was up against – me, Paul, called to take the gospel beyond Jerusalem, beyond Judea, out to the ends of the earth!

It was a tall order by anyone's reckoning, and when you remember how the Jews felt about the Gentiles, and how the Gentiles felt in return, well, you can begin to understand the scale of the problem, can't you!

I was up against it from the very start, doing my best to keep a foot in both camps to avoid causing offence, trying to share the good news, but forever keeping one eye over my shoulder, knowing the snipers wouldn't be far away. It didn't help I suppose, with my own people anyway, me being a Jew myself, schooled as a Pharisee and expert in the law to boot!

They thought I was betraying my roots, reneging on my convictions, denying the faith of our fathers.

And as for the Gentiles, many simply wondered what I was doing, pushing my nose into their affairs.

So, yes, I had my doubts, to put it mildly!

Wouldn't you have felt the same?

Who was I to overcome that sort of prejudice, to break down the barriers between us, to bring people of such contrasting backgrounds together into one

family of humankind?

Who was I to talk of a new way of thinking, of building a different sort of kingdom, of sharing a different sort of love?

Someone else perhaps – but me?

No way!

And yet the mystery is, I did!

Somehow, in a way I'll never understand, I found the strength and the words I needed when I needed them most.

I found energy to begin new tasks, courage to meet new people, faith to dream new dreams.

I unearthed reserves I never knew existed. And achieved results I never imagined possible – all kinds of people in all kinds of ways, discovering the joy of sharing and working together, discovering a faith that answered their deepest needs – a faith to live by.

It looked impossible; you can't argue with that – wonderful yet altogether ridiculous.

But it wasn't, for I've discovered since then, much to my amazement, much to my relief, that I can do all things through Him who strengthens me. Thanks be to God!

Let us pray:

Sovereign God, the challenges you set before us may be very modest compared with those faced by others over the years, but they can seem daunting, nonetheless.

We feel inadequate to meet the task, acutely conscious of our lack of faith, the limitations of our gifts and our inability to serve you as we would wish.

Yet time and again throughout history you have taken the most unpromising of material and used it in ways defying all expectations.

You have turned doubt into faith, weakness into strength, timid service into fearless discipleship, and you go on doing that today through the power of your Holy Spirit.

Give us, then, the faith to respond to your call, trusting that, whatever you ask of us, you will be by our side to help us see it through, to the glory of your name.
